Peters Family and Parkview Church Provide \$100K Lead Gift Toward New Academic Center

TBC thanks God for the generosity of Parkview Church, which is led and was planted by TBC Alumni Pastor Greg Peters ('92) and his wife Denise Peters ('96). Parkview generously gave a \$100,000 lead gift to TBC for Project Expand.

On investing eternally with TBC, Greg mentioned *"At this point in my life I'm becoming more and more interested in legacy. I want to be a part of something that will live past my own lifetime. The College enables us to do that. Instead of sending out a pastor or a missionary, this organization enables us to send out pastors and missionaries 'plural!' "*

When asked if the College could make Parkview's gift public, Greg added *"If this gift inspires others, yes. That is really my hope. Alumni Spotlight

Joseph Williams ('17)

Joseph Williams is Deputy Chaplain of the Clay County Sheriff's Office and a 2017 graduate of TBC's Interdisciplinary program with a theology concentration. In this interview he shares with us his perspective as chaplain and how a biblical worldview positively impacts law enforcement.

As an adult learner, Mr. Williams transferred to TBC from Florida State because he wanted to be in ministry. It was important to him to be prepared for whatever trajectory that might take. In fact, looking back, he says this about the chaplaincy: *"It had never crossed my mind! But when it was offered to me, I thought, well, I need to pray about this! So, I might not pastor a church in a building, but in the chaplaincy role I sort of have a little church there – that's my ministry."*

Mr. Williams, what prompted you seek an emphasis on theology when earning your degree?

I knew ministry was in my life so coming here (TBC) was a necessity in my mind. You can be charismatic and spirit-filled (and that is definitely needed) but you have to be able to deliver it too. You must know the Bible. Going here for ministry was me saying "OK, God, there is a ministry that you're going to give me. I don't want to lead them astray."

From your perspective, how does a biblical worldview positively impact policing and law enforcement?

From a moral perspective it has a huge impact (provided, of course, that it is adhered to). When you begin to look at this job from a biblical perspective you are held responsible for your own actions. At the end of the day, you cannot say you didn't know or didn't understand such-and-such. The biblical view says, "This is what Christ did – you have to do the same." It is how you live your entire life.

How do you navigate differences of worldview, cultures, and backgrounds?

I have to be open-minded, but also be firm in what I believe. I have to respect the individual and what they believe. If I disrespect them, why would they have an interest in what I have to say? God can open doors anywhere. If you see me strong in what I believe and still respectful you might end up asking me "Why do you believe what you believe?". I am always learning. I've reached out to Rabbis, Imams, pastors... I want to know how to help my inmates and get them what they need.

You are chaplain to both inmates and officers – what are the differences in your approach to each?

The major difference is that when I'm approached by inmates, I have to look for sincerity. Because the minute I realize they are not sincere I have to change my approach. You must be intuitive. Some of them need a firm hand while others just need someone to talk to.

Can you describe the role that trust plays in law enforcement and as a chaplain?

Trust is a huge factor. If officers don't trust you they won't talk to you. And if you can't talk to them you won't know if there is an underlying issue they need help with. Sometimes it's just a matter of being patient. People do not always open up immediately. I go to briefings and constantly put myself out there, letting them know I'm available. Lately I have been getting more "Hey, chap, can I talk to you afterwards?". For me it does not matter if they are big or small questions – they took the time to come ask and that means I'm making some progress.

Do you have any closing advice to criminal justice students at TBC who may go into law enforcement?

Stay connected to God. That's the main thing. And if you're a member of a local church, stay there. You are going to need the pastor and the men and women in that church!

Dr. Valerie Riley joined TBC's education department in 2002 following 25 years of experience in education and missions. Over the past two decades, her patience, compassion, and expertise have been essential in preparing over 290 TBC education graduates for success as Christian educators.

During her time at TBC, she has been instrumental in developing the Learning Accommodations Program which provides resources and assistance to make higher learning more accessible to all students.

Dr. Riley served on the TBC Library Committee, was highly involved in developing TBC's Special Education programs of study and served as TBC's Chair of Ed Policies for 10 years. She prioritized interaction with her students outside of class – often spending multiple hours every day helping students manage their workload and learn methods of study that complement their learning style.

We are grateful for Dr. Riley's contributions to the advancement of TBC's Education department in general, and our Special Education program in particular.

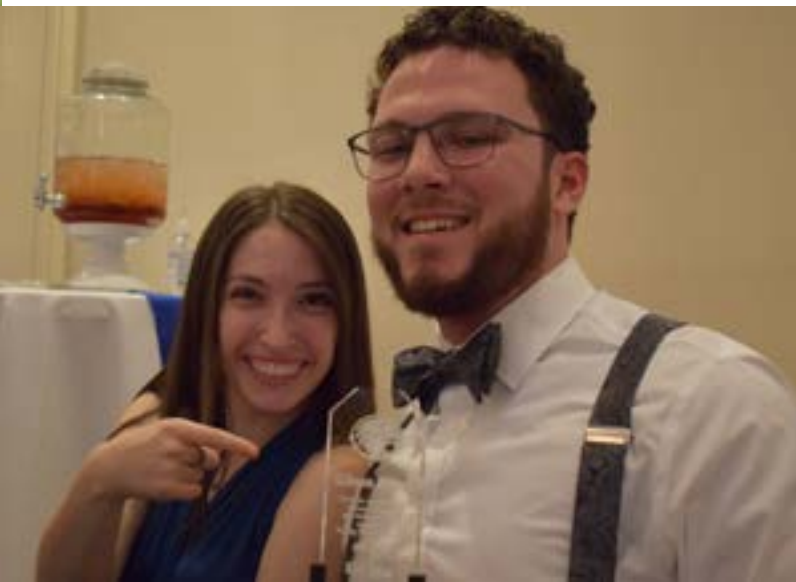
To our 2021-22 Student Body Officers:

**From the Desk of the Athletics Director:
The 2021-2022 TBC Athletics campaign
proved to be the Year of the Women!**

Under the leadership of second-year head coach Greg Calder, our TBC women's soccer team battled through incredible adversity with togetherness and resiliency to win the 2021 NCCAA South Region Championship! This led to their first ever appearance at the national tournament for our women's soccer program in school history. Calder was also named Coach of the Year twice (South Region and TBC Athletics).

In the spring, our women's softball team made incredible strides and opened many eyes in the process. Coach Leah Bennett inspired her team to rise to the level of the competition and overcome. (Our program is one of the very few non-scholarship teams in all of NCCAA Softball. Most of our competition consists of NAIA and NCAA Div. II scholarship programs.) Our Lady Eagles responded with a historic run through the region tournament, pushing eventual champion Columbia International to the last out, to claim second place. This was good enough to earn an at-large bid to nationals in Kansas City. At Nationals we won our pool to advance to the Final Four, before eventually falling.

God continues to work in and through the lives of our student-athletes to impact our "great cloud of witnesses" for the Kingdom. We are grateful for all those who support our student-athletes... through prayer, financial giving or even showing up to the games!

For the coming year, we will challenge our student-athletes to not just chase rings, but to chase the King... Jesus Christ Himself. This #Kingchasing initiative will be conducted in partnership with the organization we compete under, the National Christian College Athletic Association. Several teams are already planning a missions trip during the summer of 2023! Pray for funds to come in and that the Gospel will go forth through our platform coaches and athletes.
